Health agency questioned over future **PPE readiness**

ALBANY, N.Y. » New York's health agency is walking back a recent statement by the state's top health official, who had cast doubt on reports from nurses about dire shortages of protective gear at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic in late March and early April.

State health commissioner Howard Zucker said this week that he spoke to hospital administrators, nurses and physicians amid the pandemic, and said he was told "they have the PPE," referring to personal protective equipment.

Bowling, NYC museums get green-light to open

ALBANY, N.Y. » New York City museums and aquariums, as well as bowling alleys across the state, are getting the green light to open again, while the state will soon release guidance for indoor gyms to reopen one day.

Cuomo told reporters in a Friday conference call that low-risk, indoor cultural activities - including museums - can open in New York City starting Aug. 24.

The Metropolitan Museum of Art plans to open its doors Aug. 29, pending city and state approval, while the Museum of Jewish Heritage has announced it will reopen in September.

The governor said those cultural institutions will face restrictions: 25% occupancy, timed ticketing, pre-set staggered entry and controlled traf-



"We wanted to make sure that we could somehow capture, or chronicle even, life as it was unfolding here against the backdrop of the pandemic, so that there would be a keepsake about this," Hauprich said.

"We felt that it was important to commemorate this," Hauprich continued. "We didn't want this to be forever lost.

Hauprich and her sister had previously worked on other books about the history of Ballston Spa.

"So we had a lot of the history, and the knowledge that even though our village is now going through a very hard time, that Ballston Spa has weathered many storms and had to overcome many challenges in the past," she

As the Ballston Spa community lives through this uniquely challenging phase in its timeline, Hauprich has been inspired by how people are coming through for one another in the Village of Friends.

"You really do feel like people care a lot, and people are so much friendlier," Hauprich said. "Everybody's helping."

The book's table of contents features sections devoted to front line workers, houses of worship, patriotic organizations, service clubs and human interest stories.

Stories documented so far include the tale of how a child's 10th birthday evolved into an uplifting celebration complete with a parade, a tribute to local health care professionals who responded to early PPE supply shortages by donating their time to craft face masks on their home sewing machines, and a poignant account of a disabled octogenarian who enjoyed her final weeks surrounded by loved ones after being brought home from a nursing care facility near the start of the COVID-19 crisis.

While each individual story may seem small, "Collectively it's beautiful," Hauprich said, "when you take all of the little pieces and pull them together."

A cornerstone of the 2020 initiative is a series of Q&As with "Pillars, Posts & Supporting Beams" of the community. Some of the subjects in this series include Ballston Spa Mayor Larry Woolbright, Village Clerk Teri O'Connor, Ballston Spa Business & Professional Association executive administrator Ellen Mottola and Ballston Spa Public Library director Andrea Simmons.

Simmons said she was honored to be part of the yearbook.

"As a village employee and in being in charge of the library, the pandemic affected me both personally and professionally. Ann was smart to interview several village employees, officials, and leaders so readers could gain a sense of the behind the scenes actions the village took to keep operations safe for staff and resi-

dents," she shared. "Also, reading about people's personal narratives through a national health crisis makes them more relatable. Once the library receives this book it'll be an interesting read. In the future I can see people using it to do historical research into the actions the Village of Ballston Spa took to com-

bat COVID-19.' The sisters' ultimate goal for this project is to create a literary time capsule, "a keepsake that has chronicled the indomitable spirit of Ballston Spa as the community made the transition from the so-called 'old normal' to the 'new normal,' how they have been very successful in working together - residents and members of the business and professional commu-

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
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
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


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
